We're back!

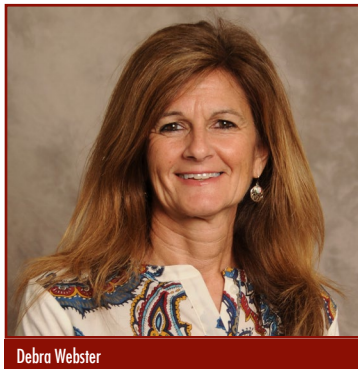
It has been quite some time since we last formally updated alumni and friends of the Salisbury University School of Nursing (SON) with our *Nursing Notes* publication. So much has taken place since our last newsletter in early 2019, and with the pandemic easing somewhat, it is time to get back to our annual installment.

First, amidst over two years of change and upheaval due to COVID-19, one thing has not changed – SU's NCLEX pass rates. Our baccalaureate nursing graduates have continued to earn the top spot for all University of Maryland institutions on the first-time NCLEX-RN pass rates at an impressive 94.79% in 2021. This impressive accomplishment is due to the hard work put forth by both our students and faculty.

There have been various administrative changes in the SON. First, after several years in the chair (2015-2018)/director (2018-2020) position, Dr. Jeffrey Willey has returned to a full-time teaching role. We thank him for his leadership during that time. I became the SON director on an interim basis from 2020-2021, stepping into the permanent role in July 2021. I was the associate chair from 2009-2018 and Undergraduate Program chair from 2018-2020. In July 2020, Dr. Kimberly Allen was appointed the Undergraduate Program chair and Dr. Annette Barnes was appointed the Graduate Program chair. Dr. Kayna Freda has continued in her role as clinical coordinator since 2018, while Dr. Jen Hart is the FNP coordinator. Dr. Amanda Willey is our newly appointed Second-Degree and RN to B.S.N. Program coordinator.

We also have three new administrative assistants. Dawn Ford works with the school director and is responsible for the budget, staffing, scheduling and many other tasks to help the SON run efficiently. Tishanna Toppin provides support to the traditional undergraduate program, while Laurie Bishop provides support to the second-degree and graduate programs. This fantastic team works hard each and every day to provide ongoing support for our programs, students and faculty.

During this time, we also bid a fond farewell to retiring faculty and welcomed many new faces. Retirements included Drs. Karen Badros, Cathy Walsh, Dorothea Winter, Michele Bracken, Voncelia Brown, Rita Nutt and Judith Jarosinski. We miss them all and wish them well!

While it is not easy to replace the dedicated faculty who retired after many years of service, we did hire many new full-time faculty in the past two years. New tenure-track faculty include **Dr. Stacy McGrath, Jacqueline Messner, Kristen Hammerer, Katie Cabrera and Rachel Weber**. We also welcomed **Dr. Molly Dale** and **Brooke Mills** in clinical faculty positions.

Dr. Stacy McGrath is a 2004 graduate of SU's second degree program and 2014 graduate from SU's masters in clinical nurse education program. She then earned her Ed.D. from Wilmington University. She previously taught at Wor-Wic Community College and works in post-anesthesia care at TidalHealth. She has joined the adult health teaching team.

Jacqueline Messner is a FNP with expertise in endocrine care; she is a certified diabetes educator. She completed her M.S.N. at Georgetown University. Prior to joining SU, Messner worked at Monocacy Health Partners Endocrine and Thyroid Specialists. She is teaching future NPs in the graduate program, as well as health assessment and research in the undergraduate program.

Kristen Hammerer earned her M.S.N. from Wilmington University and worked in the NICU setting at Anne Arundel before joining SU. She joins our maternity teaching team.

Katelynn Cabrera is a 2013 graduate of the second-degree program at SU and since has earned her M.S.N. at Wilmington University. Prior to joining SU, she worked at TidalHealth Peninsula Regional in maternity. She is a member of the maternity teaching team here at SU.

Rachel Weber joins the full-time faculty at SU in January 2022 after working in a clinical faculty role and as Lucy Tull Skills Lab coordinator since 2019. expand capacity. We added eight seats to our undergraduate program in fall 2021 and will add another eight seats in fall 2022. The plan is to increase our admissions from 65 to 81 for traditional students and from 32 to 48 for our second-degree students by 2025. The Fast Track to B.S.N. grant from the Maryland Higher Education Commission is admitting the first eight students in fall 2022 and these students will graduate August 2023, completing the program in 12 months. Faculty in the SON have also been busy completing a new five-year strategic plan, as well as aligning our curriculum with the new AACN Essentials at both the undergraduate and graduate level.

COVID-19 may have changed how we did many things over the past two years, but it did not deter our hard-working faculty from various scholarly pursuits. While we cannot possibly mention all faculty

accomplishments over the past two years, check out the Faculty News section for some of the highlights. Also check out our usual articles on graduate program news, as well as updates from the simulation center and global experiences in the SON.

Lastly, as we slowly emerge from the pandemic, we recognize the vital role that nurses have played in addressing the constant challenges brought on by COVID-19. Not only did our own faculty have to quickly pivot to create ways of providing clinical to our students online, but we also have heard countless stories of our nursing graduates who have worked, and continue to work, tirelessly to care for patients during these challenging times. We salute all of you and thank you for making the SU SON proud!

As the Graduate Program chair since June 2020, I am excited to announce that the School of Nursing (SON) has reached the 10th academic year milestone for the Doctor of Nursing Practice (D.N.P.) Program for Family Nurse Practitioners (FNP) and advanced nursing practice leaders.

The SON also continues the tradition of Master of Science in Nursing (M.S.N.) education to prepare nurse educators and nursing health care leaders.

Graduate students have provided leadership and actively participated in research, evidence-based practice and quality improvement initiatives addressing timely clinical issues. Even during the challenging past two years of COVID-19, D.N.P. projects and M.S.N. internships have been completed in a variety of acute, primary, specialty, outpatient and community settings. Additionally, thousands of practicum hours have been completed despite the various obstacles in accessing clinical sites during the height of the pandemic. The SON recognizes and appreciates

all the preceptors and contacts who provide oversight to help students develop and apply required competencies.

The M.S.N. and D.N.P. programs are approved for distance education with online courses provided for Registered Nurses (RN) who work in their communities while attending graduate school. We thank these nurses for their service as they manage multiple priorities and support one another to succeed, while being flexible and creative in their endeavors. Faculty who teach and advise students in the graduate program also have remained diligent, supportive and amenable to varied ways of teaching and learning.

RNs licensed in Maryland or a Nurse Licensure Compact (NLC) state (see <https://www.ncsbn.org/nurse-licensure-compact.htm>) are welcome to apply, with practicum required within 150 miles of the main campus in Salisbury, MD. Applications are reviewed each spring with a current deadline of May 15 for entry each fall. PANDEMIC OR NOT: LEARNING CONTINUED AT THE SIM CENTER

These past two years showed us what a group of creative thinkers with access to amazing technology can do. When SU closed its campus in March 2020, the Henson Medical Simulation Center remained open for another month to help faculty pivot to remote instruction, compile free educational resources and train patient actors in the use of technology to ensure learning experiences could continue via Zoom. The expert Sim Center staff helped faculty adapt their in-person scenarios to telehealth appointments – everything from mental health counseling to discussing end-of-life plans with family members of chronically ill patients. When we returned to de-densified in-person learning in spring 2021, we found that having students in smaller groups maximized learning because everyone had to take a more active part in their simulations.

Thanks to support from the Provost and College of Health and Human Services Dean's offices, the Sim Center was then able to acquire important new technology, including two new high-fidelity manikins and mixed reality hardware and software.



Pediatric HAL® replicates a five-year-old child who can simulate natural emotions through dynamic facial expressions, movement and speech. HAL® can cry and produce actual tears. Learners can auscultate upper and lower lung sounds on the anterior and posterior chest bilaterally and mimic a low SpO2 by turning its cheeks blue. HAL® has various palpable pulses and heart sounds, including murmurs. Learners can even obtain accurate glucose testing via a finger stick and he has multiple injection sites. HAL®'s eyes not only respond to light, but they also have tracking capabilities.

Victoria, an adult female human patient simulator, was designed to help improve safety in women's health whether pregnant or non-pregnant. Her capabilities include lifelike heart sounds, breath sounds, palpable pulses and the ability to secrete fluids. She is able to speak in real-time, made possible by an operator using a wireless headset. She also has natural eye movements, can track objects, and illustrate signs of stress, stroke, head trauma, drug use, nerve impairment and many other conditions. She can be intubated and placed on a mechanical ventilator. Victoria replicates uncomplicated labor and childbirth, as well as common complications that occur before, during and after birth. She can even be placed in a variety of positions for delivery and childbirth maneuvers. A full-term fetus of realistic size and weight can be positioned in Victoria's abdominal cavity, where it descends and rotates through the birth canal. The baby has a natural feeling umbilical cord and placenta and is equipped with active robotics that provide visible head movement and the ability to breathe and cry. After delivery, learners can obtain accurate one- and five-minute APGAR scores for this active newborn.

Also new to the Center is the use of obstetric mixed reality, where a digital object, such as a hologram, can be placed in the physical world, as if it were actually present. Learners wear a HoloLens2™ headset with synchronized holograms to see inside Victoria and observe the dynamic physiology that occurs with difficult deliveries. For example, learners can see the source of bleeding in a postpartum hemorrhage and correlate blood loss with other physiologic changes.

In addition, we secured an equipment grant through the Maryland Clinical Simulation Resource Consortium for a BD Pyxis automated medication dispensing device, which was installed in February 2021 and was used for the first time in fall 2021 in psych/mental health nursing.

Also new is our Anatomage™ Table, a three-dimensional visualization system to learn anatomy and physiology through virtual dissection. The Table contains a library of high-definition digital images to learn human and animal anatomy from gross anatomy to the microscopic level. Images of anatomical structures are presented on an interactive, life-sized touch screen that is manipulated by learners.

GLOBAL STUDENT EXPERIENCE UPDATE

The long-awaited return of the global travel-abroad course ...

As the world and its economies become gradually globalized, including extensive international travel and commerce, it is essential to think about health in a global context. In the aftermath of COVID-19, educational opportunities that prepare nursing students for a potential career in global health are even more pressing.

After a three-year hiatus, we are pleased to announce the return of study abroad this January 2023 – a four-credit Global Seminar course to Ghana. Through overseas research and immersion, the course provides a study of an international culture from an interdisciplinary perspective. It integrates classroom and field instruction to introduce students to key concepts of global health, including the fundamental principles of



Ghana's health care systems. This global health experience includes participation in a two-week comprehensive education program in Ghana under the auspices of Komfo Anokye Teaching Hospital (KATH) where students participate in hands-on experiences with an array of hospital and community-based programs designed to promote health and prevent disease, particularly in vulnerable populations.

SON LEADS GRANT AWARDS FOR 10TH YEAR STRAIGHT

The School of Nursing continues its track record of success with multiple grant awards to support expanded undergraduate and graduate student enrollment, curriculum redesign to create a 12-month second degree B.S.N. option (in addition to the current 16-month option), development of learning materials for undergraduate students and practicing nurses across the state, and expansion of the Faculty Academy and Mentorship Initiative from the Eastern Shore across the state.

A new five-year Maryland Higher Education Commission (MHEC), Nurse Support Program-II (NSP) grant, Fast Track to a B.S.N. Plus! (\$986,343), provides support to expand B.S.N. enrollments by 35% over the next five years through development of a 12-month second B.S.N. curriculum and expanded use of simulations, both manikin-based and using standardized patient actors. Co-Principal Investigators Dr. Debra and Dr. Lisa Seldomridge are excited about opportunities to offer seats to qualified first and second degree B.S.N. applicants.

The MHEC NSP-II Nursing Leadership Toolkit Grant (2017-2021) was funded for \$1,978,041 to expand simulations in three nursing courses (NURS 351 Adult Health Nursing Clinical 2, NURS 441 Internship, NURS 443 Leadership/Management Clinical). Additionally, the toolkits have been restructured for use with Nurse Residency Programs in Maryland and for continuing education offerings. Co-PIs are Dr. Debra Webster and Dr. Lisa Seldomridge.

SU SON was invited to write a five-year continuation grant to MHEC NSP-II for \$2,490,851 to expand the Faculty Academy and Mentorship Initiative of Maryland (2021-2026) to a completely online program,

offering introductory and advanced curricula. The FAMI program has multiple simulations using standardized patient actors and purchases Sim Center services to manage these virtual experiences and prepares clinical experts for positions as clinical educators for schools of nursing and health care organizations.

A statewide needs assessment conducted in 2016-2017 revealed a need for a Maryland-centric one-stop web resource with information about how to become a registered nurse, clinical nurse educator and faculty member. Thanks to a five-year \$1,793,292 grant from MHEC NSP-II www.leadnursingforward.org was created.
