

Did You Know? During the War of 1812, British troops burned the U.S. Capitol building in Washington. The building also was home to the fledgling Library of Congress. For \$23,950, Congress then bought Thomas Jefferson's personal library of 6,487 volumes to serve as the foundation of a new Library of Congress, twice as large as the library that burned.
